FACTS

- 13.7% of US population are immigrants
- 44% of immigrants are of Hispanic/Latin origins
- 6% of immigrants are from Cuba and Dominican Republic
- 8% of immigrants are from Central America, mainly El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras
- 8% of immigrants are from South America, mainly Colombia, Brazil, Venezuela, Peru, and Ecuador
- 25% of Hispanic immigrants are from Mexico
- In 2020, most Hispanic/Latin immigrants came from Mexico, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, and Cuba
- Reasons for immigration include escaping poverty, food insecurity, natural disasters, and violence, seeking asylum, educational and economic opportunities, and family reunification.
- There is a complicated history of Hispanics/Latinos in the US. Experiences of xenophobia, racism, colorism, and discrimination significantly impact the Latino community.
